**President's Message**

This President's message was written in early March of 2020; it was updated on May 4.

**March 2020:** During the march of the novel coronavirus throughout the world, due to its worldwide impact, I thought it should be highlighted for this edition of the *EFA Bulletin*.

I decided to approach this pandemic through the eyes of an extremely accomplished correspondent with *The New York Times*: Melissa Eddy. I've read her articles for many years; a few years ago, I sent her an email introducing the EFA.



Melissa is a senior correspondent who covers German politics, social issues, cultural issues, and a lot more. Check out her short bio on the *Times* website (<https://www.nytimes.com/by/melissa-eddy>).

She is a Minnesota native, fluent in German and French, who first went to Germany as a Fulbright scholar in 1996. Before joining *The International Herald Tribune* (now the international edition of *The New York Times*) in 2015, she was a correspondent for *The Associated Press* in Frankfurt, Vienna, and the Balkans.

Melissa has been at the forefront of some of the world's biggest events and I thought an ideal person to highlight for this President's message. Assigned primarily to the International edition of the *NY Times*, she's covered the big issues in Europe. Based in Berlin, she recently wrote about the impact of the novel coronavirus, designated COVID-19 by the World Health Organization.

One of her contributions has been covering German Chancellor Angela Merkel since her election in 2005. It's just one of the reasons she's seen a lot and written a lot. Here are a few of the her articles covering events; I think you'll agree her topics are on the world stage.

On March 13th, with two others, she writes: *In an unusual show of unity and resolve, European leaders said they would spend hundreds of billions of euros to prevent the coronavirus outbreak from provoking a deep recession or financial crisis. Nearly simultaneous announcements by leaders in Berlin, Brussels, Paris and other capitals contrasted with the bickering and finger-pointing that characterized Europe's response to the financial crisis a decade ago, which left economic scars that have still not fully healed. The economic toll of the coronavirus outbreak continues to rise. The French car maker Renault and Volkswagen's SEAT unit said Friday that they would close plants in Spain next week because of parts shortages. Germany, in a remarkable turnaround, dropped its insistence on balanced budgets Friday and said it would offer as much credit as businesses needed to stay afloat. France promised to compensate citizens for lost wages. Italy was expected to introduce a multibillion-euro economic aid package.*

In a March 18th article, she wrote: *The continent hit a bleak milestone in the coronavirus epidemic, surpassing China in cases and deaths. A leader who knows something about confinement pleaded for citizens to accept it, for now. Much of those cases from Italy. As of Wednesday, by official government counts, it had infected and killed more people in Europe — more than 82,000 cases and more than 3,400 dead — than in China. “Not since WW 2 has Europe had such a mess on their hands,” says Merkel. And as China slows the rate of new infections to almost zero [with their extraordinary containment policies], in Europe, now at the heart of the global outbreak, the virus is spreading faster than ever. Less than two months after the European Union sent relief supplies to China, the bloc announced that it was receiving badly needed masks and virus testing kits from China.*

On March 22nd this: *Germany bans groups more than two to fight the coronavirus. [This is the smallest of small group bans from any place.] She reports that Angela Merkel self isolates because her physician tested positive, setting the example for the world; she also goes shopping at a grocery store to demonstrate social distancing – while filling up her basket of stuff. Note: 23,900 cases in Germany with 90 deaths as of 3/22/2020.*

When this newsletter gets printed and mailed it will be May 2020, and let's hope we have a better handle on this RNA virus. The worldwide impact will be more obvious.

**May 4, 2020:** A lot has happened since early March when I began this message. For example, in the United States on March 4, there were 11

deaths from this viral disease (although this may be an underestimate). On April 4, there were 8,488 deaths. And on May 4, there have been 68,922 recorded deaths. Sadly, some estimates give a total mortality for the United States by the end of 2020 around 300,000! It's an infectious illness with a myriad of complications, mostly from the cytokine storm that can destroy tissues of all organs, not just the lungs. Of course, the most important issue is the development of a viable vaccine. There are over 70 companies working on developing a vaccine; but not all can make it through clinical trials. Currently, 40 mutations have been identified since the virus first appeared in Wuhan.

Melissa Eddy's latest article is dated today, May 4. She discusses the EU's decision to raise 8 billion Euros to fund a coordinated effort to develop several vaccines. In the US, at least one vaccine has already entered clinical trials. But there is a more worrisome article today indicating that this virus may mutate faster than previously thought, complicating vaccine development.

I hope we all stay safe, and if you do become infected with this new highly mutating coronavirus, let's hope you have one of the benign clinical courses.



### The Genealogist's Corner

Dear Cousins,

It doesn't seem possible that another year has passed. The good news is that much has been accomplished. I would like to take this opportunity to address my genealogy activities, plan, and goals and provide a progress report.



Major progress was accomplished through Lin's publishing side project merging all the established connected lines from the six books. I saw a need to go back to the foundation of the material published and held in the six books. The books are a stellar accomplishment; however, there were gaps within the data which needed to be addressed to expand the foundation from which we built out the lines. Without a solid foundation, it makes integrating newly submitted or found information difficult.

The plan was to systematically expand the record to incorporate as much of the previously unconnected submittals held and, with that completed, return to, research, and expand the data held on the second generation and forward. Working on the long-held *Unconnected* material seemed the logical next step. Most of these items were successfully connected, along

with more information captured when looking for the connection, thus growing the lines.

With that goal achieved, the next step seemed to be revisiting all earlier generations' profiles, beginning at the second generation, to obtain confirmation of existing data, find missing data, identify additional children, and expand children's information, by finding marriage data, children born, etc., and continuing the expansion of the line from generation through generation. That effort focused on the William lines. Little information was held on the lines of Abigail and Anna. John's line was better represented but also needed attention. Work on these lines through the sixth-generation children by identifying new individuals, along with adding information on those already of record and expanding the record in the seventh generation with newly identified individuals has been accomplished. Samuel's line, already containing the largest amount of information, was also researched and expanded. Since the lines are expanding rapidly, each generation consumes more time completing. As you might imagine, with large holdings for up to twelve generations, it will take time to find and incorporate new available data into the EFA record.

The inventory of remaining unconnected items will be reviewed in the future and likely many, if not most, will be incorporated due to all the additional information which has been added to the record.

The John of Taunton and John of Woodbridge lines need the same efforts put forward. Research began on the John of Taunton line in November and currently data is being identified on sixth-generation individuals and incorporated into the record. Through this effort, many new seventh generation individuals have been found and added.

It is my hope you recognize that the basics needed to be revisited and built upon. With that accomplished, ongoing attention and research will keep these lines connecting and growing. There are dozens of additional lines of submitted material to revisit to determine if, through all the new additions, they may connect to one of the established lines or represent a new line; ditto for any "brick walls." Additional areas for attention would be searching for and locating interesting articles, stories, histories, awards, achievements, famous persons, etc. to highlight in our record.

Trees of the William line and John of Woodbridge line were set up and entered through the third generation just before the new website launched. There is a major amount of input to complete. Sherri created the tree for the John of Taunton line and has been steadily adding information. In addition, she has included interesting stories and pictures, and more!

There is much to do, and anyone with an interest in one of these areas is encouraged to contact us if interested in contributing time or information.

Future goals include to occasionally attend local genealogical organizations' meetings; possibly organizing a regular meeting with family researchers in my area; and potentially hosting an annual family day. I would appreciate hearing from anyone regarding interest and feedback about pursuing these avenues. A post was made to determine if there would be interest in an Eddy family day this summer in the metro Denver area. There will be no further actions to plan a gathering this year. The EFA would like to develop a marketable report format of specific line information and pricing and would welcome feedback from members on ideas and suggestions regarding what you, or the public, might be interested in obtaining.

The EFA would also like to develop a marketable report format of specific line information and pricing and would welcome feedback from members on ideas and suggestions regarding what you, or the public, might be interested in obtaining.

Lastly, welcome to our new members and thanks for the generous additions they provided. Over the past two years, I have often worked with individuals requesting and/or submitting information. It is great to see the record expand, and expand it has!

Zachariah Eddy was a well-known lawyer and had a small office where he practiced law in Middleboro, Massachusetts...but did you know that this building, originally built in 1810 on the site of the Eddy Homestead, was moved to Storrowtown, MA in 1929 as part of the Eastern States

Exposition (called locally “The Big E”)? It remains there today along with other examples of early New England architecture



While The Big E is only open for a short time each year, “Storrowtown Village” holds events year-round.

### Family Submissions

In this section of the Bulletin, we will include contributions of family stories and articles submitted to the EFA by you, our valuable members. This submission is from our EFA President, Gary Eddey.

#### MORE ON CARNES EDDEY

Carnes Eddey was my great-great-grandfather. He was born July 9, 1827 on Staten Island, New York, and died there on January 24, 1910. We've always known that he was a ships carpenter and helped lay the keel of the Civil War ship, The Monitor. Several family obituaries mention that he worked alongside John Ericsson, one of the most creative engineers and inventors of his time. The Continental Iron Works in Greenpoint, Brooklyn, which built the first of several monitors, was probably the last shipyard Carnes worked at.

It's highly likely he got his start as a ships carpenter in one of the small yards on Staten Island. He then moved to the Lower East Side of

---

Manhattan; numerous city registers have him living there when he was in his 20s. It is not known which shipyards on the East River he worked at. At the time the Lower East Side was the location of almost all the early shipyards in NYC. After a while he moved across the East River to Greenpoint, Brooklyn to work at the Continental Shipyard. He built a house, with his cousin Corneilius Eddy, on Huron Street and from there could walk to work at the Continental shipyard. Unfortunately, all records of the Continental Iron Works have been lost or destroyed. Corneilius eventually moved back to Staten Island to start a lumber yard on a street that now bears his name. His family reverted to the Eddy spelling for some reason.

However, as much as is known about Carnes Eddey, there was always an unknown. It is well-known that the shipbuilding era of New York and Brooklyn ran from around 1840 to 1880. What did Carnes Eddey do when he left the yards?

Over the past year, as more and more real estate transfers have been made available on the internet, I've found that he continued his carpentry and management skills in a different business: the construction business. He first worked as a contractor and then as a builder. A search for property transfers in New York City and the Bronx shows numerous transfers starting in the late 1880s, mostly in Northern Manhattan or the Mott Haven part of the Bronx. At one time he owned an entire block in Washington Heights, over what is now Interstate Highway 95 as it approaches the George Washington Bridge. One of his last builds was in Marble Hill on Van Corlear near my son John's home on West 227th Street.

It makes sense that Carnes would gravitate to building homes after the collapse of the shipbuilding era in New York City. His children, however, took different paths: they became technical workers, telegraphers, administrators. One became a housewife: Catherine Eddey married George Weller; they had two sons, one of whom became a Congressman (a contemporary of Fiorella LaGuardia). Congressman Royal Weller, who went by Roy, died in office in 1929. His memorial and testimonial published by Congress are available online.

Apparently, Carnes moved back to Staten Island before he died. We believe his children remained in the house in Marble Hill, except for George Washington Eddey, who moved to Block Island in Rhode Island around 1888 to become a weather official for the US Weather Bureau.
